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SAN PU KAI BONSAI – BONSAI IDEAS

May is a good month to pay attention to Azalea bonsai. March or April had been the best months to repot and trim last year's growth. Since May is the blooming season for most bonsai varieties (remember-Satsuki means 5th month) you may enjoy the flowers without any concern for feeding and trimming. Keep the plants moist but avoid overhead watering that cause blooms to quickly lose their color and vigor. Cut back any shoots that have outgrown the design perimeters. After the flowers have reached their peak, remove all faded blooms. A flat cut at the base of the flower, removes the excessive stem elongation and allows new buds to form during warm summer months. This encourages the creation of new flower buds for next year.

Keep watering to a minimum — just enough to keep moisture in the root ball full of fine root hairs. The single most common factor that kills azaleas is the tendency to overwater. Deep watering accumulates moisture in a peat enriched soil mix and causes root rot. Water only when the surface of the plant begins to feel dry. Your finger in the soil is still the best test instrument.

Junipers and other conifers must be attended to on an ongoing basis. Continue to pinch back on growing tips of evergreens. The reduction of Auxin in these tips encourages root growth. Young, fast growing pines may still be de-candled. Spread this activity out over several days. Start low on the tree and work up to its apex.

This time of year is a terrific growing period. Spring rains (if we had any) created good health but caused excessive growth. Deciduous trees have leafed out with large healthy foliage. Keep an eye on the long internodes. Cut them back as soon as the leaves have matured.

Rethink the location of your growing benches. Have some of the nearby trees grown up and no longer allow the bonsai to get sufficient light? Is your location convenient to water and to the storage areas for soil, chemicals and tools? Can you enjoy your view of the trees from you patio or house windows? Is your display area attractive and appropriate?

The best site for your bonsai is not always up to you, as the grower. You must consider the opinions of your other family members but---bonsai is an art form and should be beautifully displayed and enjoyed by everyone.

Think about this.....
